


Assignment: This summer, we invite you to complete the following summer reading enrichment, sponsored by Dulaney faculty across a variety of content areas:

<u>A Court of Thorns and Roses</u> by Sarah J. Maas Sponsored by Mrs. Gillis, Spanish Teacher

19-year-old huntress Feyre kills a wolf in the woods, a beast-like creature arrives to demand retribution for it. Dragged to a treacherous magical land she only knows about from legends, Feyre discovers that her captor is not an animal, but Tamlin, one of the lethal, immortal faeries who once ruled their world.



The Natural by Bernard Malamud. **Sponsored by Mr. LaHatte, History Teacher**

The Natural tells the story of Roy Hobbs, a once-promising baseball prodigy who attempts to make a comeback after a gunshot wound ruined his career. The character of Roy Hobbs is very loosely based on the real-life baseball player Eddie Waitkus who was shot by an obsessed fan in 1949.




Most Dangerous by Steve Steinkin. **Sponsored by Mrs. Glenna Penner, English Teacher**





When two young rival journalists find love through a magical connection, they must face the depths of hell, in a war among gods, to seal their fate forever.




Zen and the Art of Motorcycle Maintenance by Robert

Norris Kaplan is clever, cynical, and quite possibly too smart for his own good. A Black French Canadian, he knows from watching American sitcoms that those three things don't bode well when you are moving to Austin, Texas.

Plunked into a new high school and sweating a ridiculous amount from the oppressive Texas heat, Norris finds himself cataloging everyone he meets: the Cheerleaders, the Jocks, the Loners, and even the Manic Pixie Dream Girl. Making a ton of friends has never been a priority for him, and this way he can at least amuse himself until it's time to go back to Canada, where he belongs.

In her award-winning poetry collection, Limón explores what it means to be sensitive not only to the world's pain and joys, but to the meanings that "bend in the scrim" between the natural world and the human world. In this way, the poems are organized into sections corresponding to the four seasons.

Some of the poems in the collection were written during isolation for the COVID-19 pandemic, and were sent by Limón as "gifts" to people in her world she could not see in person prior to publication of this work. Limón herself as characterized the collection as an answer to "the question of family: What is it to be connected to everything?".






<u>Lessons in Chemistry</u> by Bonnie Garmus. **Sponsored by Mrs. Marci Phillips,** Science Teacher

Chemist Elizabeth Zott is not your average woman. In fact, Elizabeth Zott would be the first to point out that there is no such thing as an *average* woman. But it's the early 1960s and her all-male team at Hastings Research Institute takes a very unscientific view of equality. Except for one: Calvin Evans; the lonely, brilliant, Nobel—prize nominated grudge-holder who falls in love with—of all things—her mind. True chemistry results.

But like science, life is unpredictable. Which is why a few years later Elizabeth Zott finds herself not only a single mother, but the reluctant star of America's most beloved cooking show *Supper at Six*. Elizabeth's unusual approach to cooking ("combine one tablespoon acetic acid with a pinch of sodium chloride") proves revolutionary. But as her following grows, not everyone is happy. Because as it turns out, Elizabeth Zott isn't just teaching women to cook. She's daring them to change the status quo.



Soulful and uproarious, forceful and tender, *Untamed* is both an intimate memoir and a galvanizing wake-up call. It is the story of how one woman learned that a responsible mother is not one who slowly dies for her children, but one who shows them how to fully live. It is the story of navigating divorce, forming a new blended family, and discovering that the brokenness or wholeness of a family depends not on its structure but on each member's ability to bring her full self to the table. And it is the story of how each of us can begin to trust ourselves enough to set boundaries, make peace with our bodies, honor our anger and heartbreak, and unleash our truest, wildest instincts so that we become women who can finally look at ourselves and say: *There She Is*.


<u>Mad Honey</u> by Jodi Picoult. Sponsored by Ms. Jamie Bare, Business Teacher

Olivia McAfee knows what it feels like to start over. She never imagined that she would end up back in her hometown, living in the house she grew up in and taking over her father's beekeeping business.

Lily Campanello is familiar with do-overs, too. When she and her mom relocate to New Hampshire for her final year of high school, they both hope it will be a fresh start. Olivia and Lily's paths cross when Asher falls for the new girl in school, and Lily can't help but fall for him, too.

Then one day, Olivia receives a phone call: Lily is dead, and Asher is being questioned by the police. Olivia is adamant that her son is innocent. But she worries about the flashes of his father's temper she sees in Ash, and as the case against him unfolds, she realizes he's hidden more than he's shared with her.
